The autumn season is upon us and that means changes for a lot more than just the leaves. With a snap to the season, some of us are moving a bit slower when we take our bikes out. For many, fall is a favorite riding season, the vibrant colors and crisp air create a colorful new world in which to explore some of our favorite roads, or to find some new ones.

Like any season however, fall has its own unique challenges. Safe riding in fall can be achieved by keeping a few simple tips in mind:

1.) You're cold, the bike is cold! As the temperature drops, your tires will take

longer to warm up, which means decreased grip for a longer period of time (now would be a good time to check that tread depth too!). Make sure to give the bike, and yourself, ample time to warm up before hitting the twisties.

- 2.) Slick leaves and hidden ice: On a sunny fall day, it's easy to forget winter is just around the corner. However, frost and ice can form overnight and linger into the day, especially on bridges and in shadows. Additionally, wet or thick leaves can be just as slippery as ice or gravel, and are a hazard that many forget about during the fall and summer months.
- 3.) Deer crossing: Deer are a year-round road hazard. However, during fall, they can be more active as they search for food and avoid hunters. Be extra cautious around dawn and dusk.
- 4.) Be prepared: In fall, warm weather can vanish in an instant. If you're planning a long trip (or even a day trip), be sure to pack extra layers or install heating elements, because riding while cold can mean riding while compromised.

Understeering - Not The Same As 'Slow Steering'

In a previous Tip entitled <u>Counter-steering</u> I spent a lot of time talking about the design of the front-end of your motorcycle in an effort to explain how counter-steering works. One of the concepts I put forward was that of steering 'slowness' caused by having <u>trail</u>. Apparently some of the readers concluded that 'slow' steering was the same as 'under-steer'. Not at all.

Whether the vehicle has two wheels or more, <u>under-steer</u> means that the vehicle's front tire(s) will break away (slide) before the rear tire(s) do during a turn. <u>Over-steer</u>, then, is just the opposite and is a design that tends to result in the vehicle's rear tire(s) breaking away first.

[Despite what I just said above, there is a more formal definition of over- and under-steer that describes how a vehicle behaves in a curve as determined by the <u>slip angles</u> of the front and rear tires. That is, if the slip angle of the rear tire(s) of a vehicle is different than that of the front, the vehicle will rotate from this phenomenon alone. If the rear slip angle is greater than the front, the vehicle is said to over-steer. If less, it understeers.]

'Under' and 'Over' refers to how the vehicle will track the desired turn when either the front or rear wheel(s) begin to slide. For example, in an OVER-steer situation the rear breaks away first. The vehicle *then* OVER rotates in the direction of the turn.

You might think that it would be better to have a motorcycle designed and setup so that there is neither over-steer nor under-steer so that you could take a turn as hard as possible without worrving about which tire broke free first. I don't think so. I'm sure you would agree that given a choice you would want your rear tire to slide before the front one. In other words, you WANT a certain 'over-steer' built into the design of your motorcycle. [Over-steering from slip angle differences results in the feeling of a modest drift into a turn. This, to most motorcyclists, is mildly reassuring and preferred to the same modest drift out of a curve that under-steering provides.]

But then you notice that your rear tire has a greater <u>contact patch</u> than does the front (at least when riding vertically.) You might assume that because of this it has a higher Coefficient of Friction with the road than does the front and that this should automatically result in under-steering. Again, not true.

Indeed, the front tire MUST develop more forces than the rear one in order to destabilize the motorcycle and cause it to change direction. (In another article you will find that the rear tire actually STEERS the bike when it is stable. Honest!) Thus, something more is at work than merely the size of the contact patch, the rubber compounds used, tread patterns, and flex of our tires that determine whether a vehicle over- or

under-steers. Your <u>front fork system</u> (rake, trail, offset), <u>weight transfer</u>, rearwheel drive and tire camber also play a part. (There should no longer be a question of why your rear tire has a flatter surface than does the front one - tire camber thrust is not as great.)

In summary:

- Your bike is designed such that it has over-steer (the rear wheel tends to break away before the front one does in a turn, and the slip angle is greater on the rear tire than on the front tire.)
- because the surface is flatter than your front tire and this results in reduced tire camber thrust. Further, part of the rear tire's traction is consumed with acceleration. The result, a tendency to over-steer particularly when accelerating. (Interestingly, unlike with motorcycles, over-throttle in a curve with most cars tends to cause under-steer.)
- ► Slow steering is a result of steering geometry and is NOT the same thing as 'under-steer'.


This month I'd like to talk about an icon of the Harley Davidson family, the XL also known as the Sportster. I have affection for this model, since I have been riding one since I first started riding back in 2004. My first model was a 2002, straight racing handlebars across, no windshield, a white beauty that sported three headlights. I still have the bike but it is on "permanent" loan to my son.

I soon fell in love with a 2004 model, this one I saw in the paper as used with 300 miles on it, after calling I discovered that the owner a young lady bought it, because she didn't want to ride behind her husband any more, unfortunately she spilled it in a field, she didn't get hurt did no noticeable harm to the bike but did bend the handlebars, they had to be replaced. What drew me to the bike was the oversized gas tank that Harley introduced in 2004, along with the rubber mounts that makes for a smoother ride. I have to admit the oversized gas tank was a big selling point for me; it made the bike so sleek looking. The smaller tank on the "02" always left a doubt in my mind whether or not I was going to get to my destination, it always looked so small.

I got into riding late in life, the only other experience I've had with any kind of

motor bike was when my family took a vacation in Florida, I was in high school, I had my license and I was able to rent a Vespa scooter for the time that we were down there.


Back to 2004, I saw an ad on TV of a young man riding into a gas station on his Sportster, it was an ad for Harley motorcycles, and of course all of the girls (if I remember correctly there were maybe 10 or 15 young ladies who just happen to be at that particular gas station at that particular time) and they were more than interested in the man and the bike. I was sold.



Although many consider the Sportster a woman's bike today it has a storied history with Harley Davidson. In first became part of the Harley family back in 1957. At the time the Harley family was losing ground to the "British" invasion of motorcycles, smaller, sleeker and lighter model, the British bikes were taking market share away from Harley. Harley's answer was to introduce a smaller, sleeker, and lighter, super bike and racing machine hence the Sportster, 58 years later is the same bike that was introduced in 1957, it has a bigger motor, some of the innovations that Harley introduced into its other models such as fuel injection, duel

piston brakes, electric start of course and other enhancements to make it safer and more reliable but it is the same Sportster of old. The Sportster has been in the Harley family longer than any of its other models.

Of note the famous dare devil Evel Knievel switched over from a Triumph that he began his jumps with to the RX 750 a Sportster, the reason he made the change, was that the Triumph was a heavier bike and he couldn't get air time to complete his jumps, by switching to the RX 750 which only weighed 300 pounds, he was able to increase his air time and extend his jumps which his public demanded.



Also of note the Sportster came into national prominence back in the 70's with the TV series, "Then Came Bronson" starring Michael Parks. Through the beauty of You tube I was able to catch several episodes and high lights, Bronson rode a red 1970 Sporty XLH.

In closing I like the open feel of the ride, I have had the pleasure of riding other bikes, a trike included during demo days, my personal preference is the feeling I get with the Sportster its simpler may not have all of the toys of its bigger brothers but with a Sportster I have more of the sensation of the open road.
